Each had been part of many other mission assistance programs, but none that prepared the villages for self-sufficiency after the mission team was gone. That was their vision. Our Vision:

“Give a man a fish, he eats for a day. Teach a man to fish; he eats for life.” That’s the concept that started it all. The Acacia Tree represents many things. Among them are purity and endurance, resurrection and immortality. According to one source, the Acacia tree is thought to have been the burning bush in Exodus 3:2), which Moses encountered in the desert. Also, when God gave Moses the instructions for building the Tabernacle, he said to “make an ark ” and “a table of acacia wood” (Exodus 25:10 & 23), Also, in the Christian tradition, it is thought that Christ’s crown of thorns was woven from acacia.
